

ATTENDANCE

In the news lately, there have been reports of increased absence levels due to COVID. We want you to know that, along with our colleagues in the Local Authority and healthcare, we are fully dedicated to ensuring the best possible attendance for all our students. With this goal in mind, we'd like to bring your attention to three recently published documents. Attendance at the start of the year is also closely linked to maintaining attendance throughout the year.

Last year, 36% of Year 1-6 students who missed school during the initial week went on to miss at least 10% of sessions throughout the academic year. When examining persistent absences (attendance below 90%), the research revealed that those who missed at least 10% of sessions were three to four times more likely to have been absent at the start of the year, those who missed at least 20% of sessions were five to six times more likely, and those who missed at least 50% of sessions were eight to eleven times more likely. Attendance is directly linked to learning. Results were found for Key Stages 1 and 2 and it was found that attunement decreases as absence increases. For Key Stage 1, students who were absent for 9-9.99% of the time were almost 20% less likely to achieve the expected level than those with regular attendance.

The final document published is a letter from esteemed healthcare professionals, including Professor Chris Whitty, Chief Medical Officer for England, who are writing on behalf of The Royal College of General Practitioners. Their letter emphasises the crucial role of school attendance in children's lives, promoting their health, well-being, and socialisation throughout their development. They also acknowledge anxiety as a common reason for absenteeism and state that being in school can often help alleviate underlying issues. They are clear in saying that a prolonged period of absence is likely to heighten their children's anxiety about attending in the future, rather than reduce it. We are deeply committed to collaborating with you and other relevant organisations to eliminate any obstacles preventing your child from attending school. If you have any concerns, please don't hesitate to reach out. Together, we can work to secure your child's good attendance at school.

A reminder too, that we have access to the Colehill Parish Council Carpark in the mornings for those dropping to Colehill, if you wish to park there for drop off.
