The first is a Powerpoint **Quiz** all about Dorset, with Eric Watson as Quiz Master. This is on **Friday 30th November**, starting at 7.30 pm, in Colehill Memorial Hall. There's a cash prize of £50 for the winner of the Quiz (or £50 to be shared between the winning table). We will have some fun Bingo in the interval also with cash prizes, and, as usual, it's a Bring Your Own drinks affair and the tickets are a mere £5 – obtainable at the Library.

The second is our last coach trip of the year and this is to Longleat for the **2018 Festival of Light – Friday, 7th December**, departing at 1 pm. It's a magical winter experience with hundreds of stunning Chinese lanterns (with 'A Fantastic Voyage' theme) positioned around the formal gardens and the main square. They will be lit at approximately 4 pm and it takes about an hour to see them all. There will also be a 50 ft performing Christmas tree which tells a magical story, alongside a light and music projection quite unlike anything you will have seen before. Remembrance 2018 *Lest We Forget*

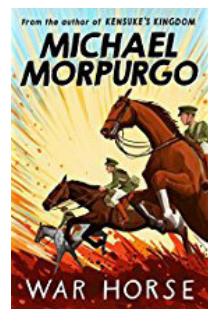
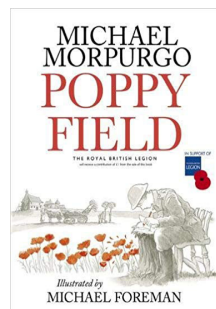
Just a reminder for those of you who might be considering responding to St Michael's Church suggestion that residents write about a relative or friend who experienced the Great War.

The Library has free access to **Ancestry** online which has a wonderful selection of military records. Some of the records give physical descriptions as well as battles fought, injuries received, medals won, previous occupation and next of kin.

Follow it up with Google search to find some of the historical background and what it would have been like for your family member to live through that time.

Our **Family History Group** meets on the first Thursday morning of the month from 10 am - noon, but you are able to use Ancestry during all library opening hours. Please ask for help if needed.

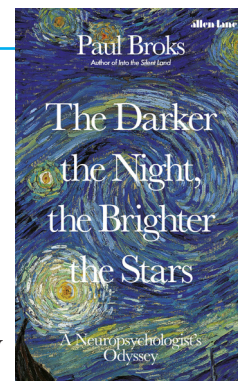

Book Review

The Darker the Night, the Brighter the Stars, A Neuropsychologist’s Odyssey by Paul Broks

Some months ago I caught the tail end of a programme on Radio 4 reviewing a new book by the neuropsychologist, Paul Broks. It’s clearly a popular book as it was on a waiting list on the library reservation service. I reserved it and waited. It came when I was just about to go on holiday, so I returned it immediately and tried again. The wait was worth it. I’m half way through and already realised it’s a book I shall dip into for the rest of my life - one to buy and give precious shelf space to.

The text inside the book flap says “When celebrated neuropsychologist Paul Broks’ wife died of cancer, he found himself plunged into the world of the bereaved. As he experienced the pain, alienation and suffering that make us human, his clinician-self seemed to watch on with keen interest. He embarked upon a voyage of experience: a journey through grief, philosophy, consciousness, humanity and magical thinking – seen through the prism of a lifetime’s work in neuroscience. Fusing an account of living with and recovering from loss with thought-provoking meditations on the nature of the mind and the self, ‘The Darker the Night, the Brighter the Stars’ is an audacious and beautiful work by a writer of astonishing wisdom and compassion.” If you find yourself thinking ‘not another book on grief’ then just pick on the word magical for a moment. Of the 21 chapters I’ve read so far (most are a couple of pages or so) there are headings of ‘The wooden sword, ‘Stardust’ and ‘Dolphins’. I’m reading about Greek gods one minute and free will the next. His writing style is wonderfully relaxed. It is another treat of a book which I can recommend to anyone, whether you are coping with grief or not. *Christine.*
